Who's Who

John Becker (Judge Hathorne) has appeared at the Playhouse in *She Loves Me*, *The Dining Room*, and *Side By Side By Sondheim*. He has also worked with the Florham Park Players (*Hello Dolly*, *Rumors*), the Stony Hill Players (*A Funny Thing Happened ...*, *Blithe Spirit*), the Dover Little Theater (*Pirates of Penzance*, *Harvey*), and several other groups.

Maureen Bentley (Ann Putnam) has acted at various regional theaters in Connecticut, Colorado, Pennsylvania and New York. Most recently, she appeared as a digitized (but very elegant) Lady Capulet, in a high-tech production of *Romeo and Juliet* at Kean University in Union, where she teaches Acting and Improvisation.

Rick Brown (Rev. John Hale) has appeared in numerous area productions, including *The Wild Duck* (Gregers), *Separate Tables* (John Malcolm), *Awake and Sing* (Moe), *Guys and Dolls* (Sky), *Brigadoon* (Tommy), *Titanic* (Charles), *Summer and Smoke* (Dr. Johnny), *Of Mice and Men* (George), *The Elephant Man* (Trevs), *A Midsummer Night's Dream* (Lysander), *The Fantasticks* (El Gallo), *Assassins* (Czolgosz), and *The Lion in Winter* (Philip). Elaine Dooman (Sarah Good) is pleased to be acting in such a moving play, in such good company.
