Director's Notes

Why *The Imaginary Invalid* you may ask. You certainly would not be the first within earshot to ask that question. The explanation becomes simple after knowing a few facts. Molière is considered the father of modern comedy. In fact, he created comedy as we know it today. Without a doubt, the formula for many a Broadway or Hollywood comedy can be traced back to Molière, not Shakespeare or Aristophanes. Also an accomplished actor, his plays contain all the elements of great farce. He knew all the tricks: the cumulative effect of repetition, the echo-dialogue, the change of pace, the double take, the pratfall, the funny walk, and so on. But more than that, he was able to incorporate these devices into farces which commented on contemporary society in Paris of the 17th century. Many of these themes still echo for today's audiences.

Le Malade Imaginaire, The Imaginary Invalid, was Molière's last comedy. Ironically, on February 17, 1673, during the first week of the play's original run, as Molière was playing the leading role, he was taken ill onstage and died a few hours later. Whether his refusal to submit to the "treatments" of the doctors of the time was the actual cause of his demise can be debated at length, but it was certainly one of the greatest exits in theatrical history.
