

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

"...But men labor under a mistake. The better part of a man is soon plowed into the soil for compost. By a seeming fate, commonly called necessity, they are employed, as it says in an old book, laying up treasures which moth and rust will corrupt and thieves break through and steal. It is a fool's life, as they will find when they get to the end of it, if not before."

One might imagine Kaufman and Hart at dinner one night, mulling over their successes in the theatre world of the 1930's, a copy of *Walden* propped between them on the table, opened to the first chapter, "Economy," frantically searching for the next premise for a hit play that would resonate in a beleaguered audience in the Great Depression, letting their eyes cast down upon the above words by Henry David Thoreau and instantly becoming inspired to write tonight's offering. Maybe. At any rate, it was an instant success with that audience, and the truth of Thoreau's theme of simplicity, magnanimity and trust as the highest level of human accomplishment comes through in the gentle humor and lovable characters that are the center of the play. In these days of contrast of liberal and conservative values to which we can lose all sense of proportion and objectivity, it is ever so refreshing to reflect on a philosophy that has remained a part of the American Dream through centuries of turmoil—and ultimately come to realize that we *can* take something with us—our dignity, compassion, tolerance, and respect for that which is seemingly crazy, but ultimately visionary. If we can do it through laughter and comedy, so much the better, for, as another great writer, Christopher Fry quipped, "...laughter is surely the surest touch of genius in creation...an irrelevancy which almost amounts to a revelation." We hope tonight's performance inspires that same laughter!

Who's Who

Claire Bochenek (Alice) makes her debut at The Summit Playhouse in the role of Alice. Claire's previous theater credits include Alais in a *A Lion in Winter* and Mrs. Kirby in *You Can't Take It with You*. She is a competitive ballroom dancer, has attended the Berklee College of Music in Boston, MA, and plans on pursuing a career in the performing arts. She sends love to her family and friends.

Bud Dawson (Boris Kolenkhov) remembers his debut in *Riverwind*, the Playhouse's first musical. Other playhouse productions spanning forty years include *Fiorello!* (The Quartet), *On Golden Pond* (The Dentist), *Critics Choice* (The Lead), *Twigs* (The Drunk), 1940's *Radio Hour* (Johnny Cantone) and *Side by Side by Sondheim*. In other New Jersey venues, he has appeared in *Annie* (Daddy Warbucks), *Annie Get Your Gun* (Buffalo Bill), *The Dining Room* (four roles), *The Boy Friend* (the lead) and *Bells Are Ringing*. STAFF

Mitch Ruf (Director) has recently become involved again with community theatre after a teaching career that has spanned over thirty years in N.J. Education, the last 25 of which have been spent teaching at Lenape Valley Regional High School in Stanhope (recently recognized by the NJ Arts Education Census Project as among the top 10 percent in the state for its performing arts programs). In those three decades he has produced, designed and directed over 100 shows (including *You Can't Take it With You*—twice!). As a performer, favorite shows in which he has assumed leading roles have been *Camelot*, *The Importance of Being Earnest*, *The Student Prince*, *George M.*, *Company*, *1776*, *Jaques Brel*, *Damn Yankees*, and (in younger days), *Tony* in *West Side Story* and *Tony* in *You Can't Take It With You*. He was seen on the Summit stage this past spring as Senex in *Forum*, and was therein privileged to have the opportunity to perform with his two greatest productions—his daughter Maggie and son Matthew! Mitch is delighted to have the opportunity to work again with the theatre, its staff


