Robbi Curtis (Sister Aloysius Beauvier), a Playhouse member since 1984, has appeared in *She Loves Me* (Amalia), *Side by Side by Sondheim, The Diary of Anne Frank* (Mrs. Frank), *The Dresser* (Her Ladyship), *Enchanted April* (Francesca), *An Actor's Nightmare* (Sarah Siddons), and *Fiorello!* (Mrs. Pomerantz) among others. She has directed *Lend Me a Tenor, Remembrance, A Grand Night for Singing,* and several benefits for the Playhouse. On other stages, her favorite roles include Eleanor of Aquitaine in *The Lion in Winter,* Agnes in *I*

Do! I Do!, Guinevere in *Camelot*, Eliza Doolittle in *My Fair Lady*, and Ethel Thayer in *On Golden Pond*. Offstage, she is married to George Doherty, our Stage Manager, and they spend as much time as they can with their four wonderful grandchildren. From The Playwright

I've set my story in 1964, when not just me but the whole world seemed to be going through some kind of vast puberty. The old ways were still dominant in behavior, dress, morality, world view, but what had been organic expression had become a dead mask. I was in a Catholic church school in the Bronx, run by the Sisters of Charity. These women dressed in black, believed in Hell, obeyed their male counterparts, and educated us. The faith, which held us together, went beyond the precincts of religion. It was a shared dream we agreed to call Reality. We didn't know it, but we had a deal, a social contract. We would all believe the same thing. We would all believe.

Looking back, it seems to me, in those schools at that time, we were in an ageless unity. We were all adults, and we were all children. We had, like many animals, flocked together for warmth and safety. As a result, we were terribly vulnerable to anyone who chose to hunt us. When trust is the order of the day, predators are free to plunder. And plunder they did. As the ever widening Church scandals reveal, the hunters had a field day. And the shepherds, so invested in the surface, sacrificed actual good for perceived virtue.

I have never forgotten the lessons of that era, nor learned them well enough.
