## My Best Friend(s)

It's always difficult — every time we say goodbye.

But particularly the first time...

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We had shared everything together. I think we both were crying when the time finally came. That dreaded day arrived. Somehow I summoned all my courage and left... for elementary school. His name was "Skippy," and I missed him for most of the day, or at least until lunch. But I never, ever, forgot him: my first dog.

Except for periods of mourning, I would never go without a dog for the rest of my life. For fellow dog lovers in the audience, the question of whether or not a dog is really a person is no question at all! The fancy word for the attribution of human characteristics to non-humans is anthropomorphism. It's really a deeply embedded human impulse — that is growing as our society continues to interact in a non-personal digital world. It's not coincidental that dogs are known as "man's best friend." As James Serpell, the Director of the University of Pennsylvania's Center for the Interaction of Animals and Society says, "As we lose social support, as our relations become fragmented, we are using dogs to fill the gap."

And for those of you who might leave the theater tonight thinking about acquiring a dog — where will this most important creature in your life come from, and what process will you use to choose your canine companion? Before we all enjoy the comedy that is about to unfold, consider this statistic: over 56% of dogs and puppies entering shelters are killed because there are not enough people to adopt them (National Counsel on Pet Population Study). Sylvia's fear of the pound her mention of their "time limits" — is an actual reality, particularly in NYC. Fortunately, for the last 70 years, we have had a marvelous resource nearby — St. Hubert's Animal Welfare Center in Madison, NJ (973-377-2295). At St. Hubert's there is no time limit — all animals are kept until they are adopted! If you haven't stopped by in a while, you might enjoy a visit — a new large expansion is already under way. The adoption hours are Tuesday–Sunday, 12–4. And just one more point, regarding the "otherwise" you might be considering: All dogs in pet stores are from puppy mills. Jackie Fahey, St. Hubert's Director of Animal Welfare, tells me that even though you may be presented with some official looking paperwork, no trust worthy breeder sells animals through pet stores.

And now — back to the jokes. Mr. Gurney wrote *Sylvia* in 1995, and had fun at that time with current political humor. I have attempted to update some of the material to reflect our 2010 society — and I hope you'll all know we only want to make you laugh, at a culture we couldn't possibly make up. Enjoy!
